The Origins of Groundhog Day

On February 2, 1887, Groundhog Day, featuring a rodent meteorologist, was celebrated for the first time at Gobbler's Knob in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania. According to tradition, if a groundhog comes out of its hole on this day and sees its shadow, it gets scared and runs back into its burrow, predicting six more weeks of winter weather; no shadow means an early spring.

Groundhog Day has its roots in the ancient Christian tradition of Candlemas, when clergy would bless and distribute candles needed for winter. The candles represented how long and cold the winter would be. Germans expanded on this concept by selecting an animal—the hedgehog—as a means of predicting weather. Once they came to America, German settlers in Pennsylvania continued the tradition, although they switched from hedgehogs to groundhogs, which were plentiful in the Keystone State.

Groundhogs go into hibernation in the late fall. In February, male groundhogs emerge from their burrows to look for a mate (not to predict the weather) before going underground again. They come out of hibernation for good in March.

In 1887, a newspaper editor belonging to a group of groundhog hunters from Punxsutawney called the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club declared that Phil, the February is National African-American History Month, American Heart Month, and National Library Lover's Month.

- -February's full moon is known as the **Snow Moon.** The explanation is a fairly straightforward one: it's due to the typically heavy snowfall that occurs in February.
- -February's birthstone, the **amethyst**, thought to prevent intoxication and keep its wearer thinking sharply.
- -February's birth flowers are the violet and primrose.

Dressed-Up Crab Rangoon Dip

Ingredients

- -12 ounces cream cheese, softened
- -2 cans (6 ounces each)
 crabmeat, well drained and picked over for shells
- -3 scallions, chopped
- -2 tablespoons chopped roasted red peppers
- -3/4 cup shredded Swiss cheese
- -1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- -1 teaspoon prepared horseradish
- -1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- -1 tablespoon milk
- -1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

Punxsutawney groundhog, was America's only true weather-forecasting groundhog. The line of groundhogs that have since been known as Phil might be America's most famous groundhogs, but other towns across North America now have their own weather-predicting rodents, from Birmingham Bill to Staten Island Chuck to Shubenacadie Sam in Canada.

Team USA Winter Olympians with Connections to Maine



The Winter Olympics are being held in Beijing, China from February 4th thru the 20th. This year there are five athletes on Team USA that were either born in Maine, attended high school or college in Maine, or trained here.

Frankie Del Duca - Bobsled Frankie attended Telstar High in Bethel. That led to him running track at the University of Maine, where he and fellow U.S. bobsledder Jimmy Reed still rank second on the school's all-time list in the 400-meter relay (and where Del Duca is still ranked in the top 10 in the long jump, 100 and 200).

Jimmy Reed - Bobsled Jimmy graduated from UMaine in 2014, holding school records in the indoor 55 meters and 60-meter hurdles and the outdoor 110 hurdle.

- -1/4 teaspoon salt
- -1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- -2 tablespoons chopped slivered almonds
- -1 scallion, green part only, chopped, for garnish

Instructions

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Spray an 8x8-inch baking dish with nonstick cooking spray; set aside.

In a bowl, mix together the cream cheese, crabmeat, scallions, red peppers, Swiss cheese, Parmesan, horseradish, Worcestershire sauce, milk, garlic powder, salt, and black pepper.

Place crab mixture into prepared baking dish and bake for 20 to 25 minutes, or until bubbly around the edges. Top with almonds and cook for 5 minutes more. Garnish with chopped green scallions.
